WELCOME TO THE COMPETITIVE CLASSES FOR 2012

As in previous years we have made some changes to the classes in order to keep things fresh and encourage higher standards. In the flowers, fruit and vegetables classes we will present the Ashford Cup for the best horticultural exhibit in the show. This is a prize that has been missing for a number of years. We have deleted the orchid classes after two years of poor entries and in their place added some extra sweet pea classes as these gain in popularity each year. Last year's newly introduced Master Gardener class continues after the success of 2011. Recognising the cost of exhibiting in class 101 (Group Display class) we are offering £25 expenses to all clubs that take part. Last year we revamped the dahlia classes. Taunton Flower Show is quite early in the season for dahlias and, recognising the difficulty of finding five blooms in each class, we have reduced this to three.

Our major upgrade this year is in divisions 5 and 6. Division 5 is now purely for cookery and preserves and caters for both group and individual entries. There are three new championship classes in this division to enable individuals to demonstrate the full breadth of their skills. Division 6 is now just for art and craftwork and this year we have introduced Fine Art and Textile Art competitions. These feature a much wider range of classes and are designed to encourage higher standards in the art classes and provide a high quality exhibition for our visitors.

The Young People's classes this year are themed on London 2012 and the handwriting competition features a poem that has been specially commissioned for this class and is unique to Taunton Flower Show 2012. As last year, we are again running the Taunton Flower Show Young Photographer of the Year competition which is kindly sponsored by Porter Dodson.

HOW TO ENTER TAUNTON FLOWER SHOW

These instructions are for general guidance only. Competitors should make sure they have read and understood the Taunton Flower Show Regulations 2012 on pages 22-24.

- Anyone is eligible to make competitive entries in the flower show. Some classes or divisions are a) restricted to members of particular groups or are for novices etc. The classes in the young people's division are restricted to particular specified age groups.
 - Where entry to classes is restricted, this is indicated in this schedule. Exhibitors must make sure they are eligible for the classes they intend to enter. Many of the classes contain special instructions; these are shown in the schedule. Entrants are advised to follow all such instructions very carefully. Please make sure that you enter your exhibit in the correct class to avoid being disqualified as "not according to schedule".
- When you have decided which classes you wish to enter, you should complete the entry form (see b) page 27) and make sure the form reaches either of the addresses shown on the entry form by 12 noon on Friday 27th July 2012. Please use one entry form per person. Extra entry forms can be found on the show's website or are available from the show secretary. Members may enter by email: see the website for details or email to entries@tauntonflowershow.co.uk

You may only make ONE entry in each class.

Make sure you include a cheque to cover your entries to the correct amount. NOTE that entries are FREE for individual members of Taunton Flower Show. ALL entries in the young people's classes (division 10) are FREE. See page 2 if you wish to become a member of the show. Note: you don't have to be a member to take part. Membership applications MUST be received by 30 April 2012.

- You should bring your exhibits to the competitive marguee between the times specified on the front c) cover. NOTE that some exhibits must be made up in the tent, these classes are indicated in the schedule. Make sure you bring everything you may need to stage your exhibits. Remember that pots and vases are NOT supplied and you should bring your own.
- You should collect your entry cards from the control point inside the competitive marquee. Once you d) have staged your exhibit, place the exhibit card for that class FACE DOWN with your entry. If you are unsure what to do, please see one of the stewards who will be on duty. Entries in division 11 (Wine and beer) are staged in the wine marguee.
- e) All exhibits should be staged as attractively as possible with the exhibits in the best possible condition. Always take some extra specimens to cope with emergencies. Presentation is a key part of the competition and we encourage a high standard.
- Fruit, flowers and vegetables are judged in accordance with RHS rules (with the exception of division f) 4, Novices) and the floral art classes will be judged to NAFAS standard. If you are entering these classes, it will be useful to make yourself familiar with their requirements. RHS rules are included in a small booklet titled "The Horticultural Show Handbook" which is available from the RHS website and contains excellent advice.
- You MUST have staged all your exhibits and have left the marguee by 7.45am on FRIDAY 3rd g) August. You may NOT remove your exhibits before 5.30pm on Saturday 4th August.
- h) Prize money can be collected after 3pm on Saturday from the control point in the marquee. Cups and trophies will be presented in the competitive marquee at 4.30pm on Saturday.
- Have fun and enjoy yourself! We look forward to seeing you at the show. j)

JUDGING OF WINES

Judges will be asked to judge wines and beers according to the definitions contained in the "Handbook of the National Guild of Wine and Beer Judges" - revised 2000 and this should be consulted by competitors requiring full details. The following guide may assist exhibitors in choosing the right class of wines.

DEFINITIONS OF WINES

Aperitif. A wine that can be drunk by itself before a meal and stimulates the appetite.

Table Wine. A wine that is suitable for accompanying a meal. Generally not too strong in bouquet and flavour, with an alcohol content of only 10-12%.

After Dinner Wine. This wine can be white, golden, red or tawny. It needs to be rich in bouquet and flavour, medium to sweet, full bodied and of high alcohol content. It should preferably be served at the end of a meal.

Social Wine. Widely made and drunk. This wine is intended for drinking other than with a meal. It is usually less strong and rich than a dessert wine, though with more flavour and sweetness than a table wine.

Rose Wine. Not necessarily made from rose petals, this wine should be pink to pale red, delicate in bouquet and flavour, light in texture and alcohol and medium dry. It is suitable for serving at the table with many dishes.

RECIPE CLASS

1122 MEDIUM DRY ROSE

13/4 lb Redcurrants (fresh or frozen); 1/2 lb Strawberries (fresh or frozen)

1/2 litre White grape juice; To sweeten, approx 1/2 litre Apple juice (not from concentrate)

1 tsp Pectolytic Enzyme; Nutrients; Yeast;

1³/₄ lb Sugar; Boiled water to 1 gallon.

Cover the redcurrants and strawberries with $1\frac{1}{2}$ pts water, crush the fruit, add a campden tablet plus Rohament P and leave for 24 hours.

Meanwhile rehydrate the yeast and build up a starter with grape juice. Next day strain liquid off the redcurrants and strawberries, squeezing lightly. Dissolve the sugar in water and add with the strained liquid to the demijohn. Top up to 1 gallon with cooled boiled water. Add nutrient and pectolytic enzyme and ferment out to completion.

Once the fermentation is complete add $\frac{1}{2}$ litre of apple juice (good quality) adjusting the wine to medium dry. You will now have slightly more than a gallon but it should fit in a demijohn. Stabilise the wine with campden and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp potassium sorbate. Use finings if necessary. The finished wine should be 12-12 $\frac{1}{2}$ % ABV.

RULES APPLICABLE TO EXHIBITORS IN THE WINE AND BEER CLASSES

Please read in conjunction with Taunton Flower Show regulations shown below.

- STAGING AND COLLECTION OF EXHIBITS. Exhibits must be staged during the times specified in this schedule. Exhibitor cards are collected from the control point in the competitive marquee. All exhibits must remain on show until 5.30pm on the second day of the show. Collection must be supervised and checked by an appointed steward.
- 2. BOTTLES:
 - (a) Still Wines must be exhibited in clear unbranded white flint glass approx. 26 fl.oz. capacity with rounded and NOT sloping shoulders. The new French sauterne type of bottle with the shallow punt and slightly more sloping shoulders will be accepted. Wine bottles should be filled so that when the cork is fully inserted the gap between the bottom of the stopper and the wine is between 6 to 20 mm (approx. $\frac{1}{4}$ " to $\frac{3}{4}$ ").
 - (b) Aperitif Dry, any colour, competitor to state on the label by the Judge's reference number either Citrus, Herb or Sherry.
 - (c) Liqueurs must be exhibited in clear colourless glass punted ½ wine bottles of approx. 13 fl.oz. (370ml) to leave airspace as in (a). They MUST have a base of home-made wine. Fortification is allowed with Vodka.
 - (d) Beer must be exhibited in 1 pint either clear or coloured beer bottles with brass coloured crown caps only and filled to leave an airspace from ½" to 1". In the interest of safety, competitors should ensure that the bottle pressure is not excessive; also non-returnable

(disposable) bottles are not to be used. Sediment will be allowed. Ales must not be artificially carbonated.

- CORKS: White Plastic Topped flanged cork stoppers to be used, corks may be wired for travelling purposes. NOTE: Flush corks and all-plastic stoppers MUST NOT be used, capsules must not be fitted.
- 4. LABELS: For kit wine classes, the name of the kit/concentrate must be written clearly on a label fixed to the bottle.
- 5. NO EXHIBIT may be tasted or in anyway interfered with whilst on the Show bench by the exhibitor or any other person unless accompanied by a steward or the show secretary.
- 6. CARE OF EXHIBITS: All reasonable care will be taken, but the Committee cannot accept responsibility for any loss or damage, however sustained.
- 7. TROPHIES: will only be given when the Judge has first given a First Award.
- 8. JUDGES AND STEWARDS: may enter any of the open classes but the judge MUST withdraw his entry from the classes which he is judging.
- 9. WINES: Which have been fortified by the addition of alcohol spirit will be disqualified. The liqueur class will be exempt from this rule.
- 10. All Classes, except 1114 and 1115, must be based on ingredients other than wine kits or grape concentrate.
- 11. POINTS AWARDED AT JUDGES DISCRETION: 1st 10; 2nd 7,3rd 5, H.C. 3, C 1.
- 12. TROPHIES: Are the responsibility of the holders while in their possession, and should be returned when requested by the committee.

AN EXTRACT FROM TAUNTON FLOWER SHOW REGULATIONS – 2012 To specify those relevant to all Exhibitors in all Competition Classes

GENERAL

- 1. These General Regulations shall apply to all exhibitors in the Floral Marquee, Craft Marquee, Food Hall, outside stand-holders, entrants in the Designer Gardens and Ready Steady Garden competitions and exhibitors in the scheduled classes. In these Regulations "the Society" is Taunton Deane Horticultural and Floricultural Society and its successors and "the Committee" is the Show Management Committee.
- 2. The Committee has power to refuse any exhibit that it considers unworthy of being shown and also to reject and order the removal of any unsightly or unsuitable stands, receptacles or staging.
- 3. All exhibits, stands, equipment, stock and any other property belonging to any exhibitor or trader at the Show are the responsibility of the exhibitor or trader and remain in the Showground at his, her or their own risk. The Committee will endeavour to provide protection, but it will not accept any liability for loss or injury arising from any cause whatsoever or howsoever arising within the Showground. The Committee wishes to advise exhibitors that it is unwise to leave any items of value within the Showground, which items are the exhibitors' own responsibility. Exhibitors and Traders are responsible for ensuring that their own exhibits comply with Health and Safety Regulations.
- 4. Judging will commence at 8.00 am on Friday. Judging of all exhibits will be in accordance with the Rules and Guidelines of the Royal Horticultural Society and/or those of a specialist national society. No exhibitor, unless officially engaged, will be allowed to remain in the marquee during the judging process. Any protest against the decisions of the judges must be made in writing to the Show Secretary before noon on Friday accompanied by a deposit of £5 in the case of the scheduled classes which will be returned if the protest is upheld or otherwise forfeited. Subject to the determination of any protest the decision of the judges is absolutely final and binding.
- 5. Judges shall not be competitors in any class in which they are appointed to judge and they shall not be present during the staging of exhibits. They have the power to withhold or reduce prizes for any exhibit that, in their opinion, does not merit an award and to cut, taste or otherwise examine any exhibit.



- 6. All exhibitors must observe the one-way traffic system operated in the Showground. Exhibitors in the competitive classes must remove their vehicles from the showground by 8.00am on the first day of the show and will not be permitted to return until after 6.00pm on the second day of the show when authorised by a steward or other official.
- 7. All forms of sponsorship at the Show, whether arranged directly through the Society or indirectly by any exhibitor or trader, must be subject to the prior approval of the Committee.
- 8. In the event of the cancellation of the Show by the Committee before its advertised time of opening by reason of any circumstances beyond the control of the Committee no exhibitor shall have any claim on the Society for any loss, damage, interest or compensation whatsoever.
- 11. NO DOGS OTHER THAN ASSISTANCE DOGS ARE PERMITTED IN THE SHOWGROUND.

EXHIBITORS IN THE SCHEDULED CLASSES

- Every exhibitor must submit an entry form specifying the classes to be entered with the requisite entry fees by 12 noon seven days prior to the show. The exact date is shown on the entry form. Members of the Flower Show may enter exhibits without fee other than in any imposed class or for group exhibits. Exhibitors may only make one entry in each class.
- 22. An exhibitor whose entry fees amount to at least £8 will also receive one non-transferable ticket for admission once to the Show and which will be issued to non-members with their class tickets in the Competition Marguee when staging their entries.
- 23. Exhibits must be staged during the times quoted in the schedule and MUST remain staged until 5.30pm on the second day of the Show when a bell or whistle will be sounded. Officials will then clear the marquee of ALL persons including exhibitors. When this has been achieved exhibitors will then be re-admitted to remove their exhibits. These must be removed by 7pm.
- 24. Exhibitors will be allowed to take into the showground only such assistants as are reasonably required for the staging of their exhibits.
- 25. A card for every class entered will be supplied to each exhibitor, cards being issued from the control point in the Competition Marquee. The exhibitor will be responsible for the proper placing of each exhibit in the space allotted with the card face down unless otherwise specified in the Schedule.
- 26. All exhibits (other than floral art) must have been grown or made and be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor. A declaration to that effect must be made when entering. No exhibit entered at any previous Taunton Flower Show will be accepted for entry at this show. Any competitor obtaining a prize fraudulently will forfeit all prize money to which he may otherwise be entitled and will be excluded from future Shows.
- 27. Exhibitors must provide their own accessories, vases, dishes, baskets and other requisites, except where otherwise stated in the Schedule.
- 28. Prize money may be collected from the Control Point in the Competition Marquee between 3.00pm and 7.00pm on Saturday. Prizes not claimed at the Show will normally be assumed to have been donated to the Show.
- 29. Irrespective of the prize money awarded in each class, points will be awarded for the determination of trophies as follows: First Prize: 6 Points; Second Prize: 4 Points; Third Prize: 2 Points unless otherwise indicated in the schedule. In the event of a draw, the trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest number of first prizes, if there is still a draw then the highest number of second prizes and then third prizes will be taken into account.
- 30. If the judges award equal prizes in any class the points/prize money relating to that prize and the appropriate number of prizes next below it/them in that class according to the number of joint winners, will be added together, and the total divided equally between each of those joint winners.
- 31. The Royal Horticultural Society's Banksian Medal is awarded to winner of the largest total amount of money in prizes in the whole of the horticultural classes at the show. Any competitor who has won the Banksian medal in the last two years is not eligible to win this medal. Those sharing in the cultivation of, and exhibiting from, the same garden and/or allotment are considered to be a single exhibitor. If one is awarded the medal then none of them is eligible for the next two years.

ACCESS AND TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS

Parking for competitors unloading and loading for the Competitive Marquee will be in the central arena as directed by stewards. Cars MUST be cleared from this area before 9am on Friday and will be admitted to the showground, in liaison with the police, as soon as possible after 6pm when the Show closes on Saturday. No precise time can be given for this, as it will depend upon the conditions and the speed with which the Show roadways are largely cleared of pedestrians and judged safe by the police for vehicular traffic to enter.

There will be a one-way traffic system in operation within the park and the surrounding roads. For access to the show, traffic should come along The Mount/Mountway into Ash Meadows and when leaving the showground turn left along Mount Street and turn left into Mary Street/Upper High Street.

Pedestrian access for staging exhibits prior to the show opening will be ONLY from the Ash Meadows gate. For site security, pedestrians will NOT be able to enter the showground from the High Street gate before the show opens.
